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Bible Lesson #19: Moses Intercedes

You are about to read the story of Israel and the golden calf. This is definitely not Israel’s finest hour. Moses has been on the mountain with God receiving the Commandments. In his long absence, the people grow impatient and Aaron makes them a golden calf. The people want a god they can see and touch. They enter into idolatry. Living in Egypt has had a great effect on them. In the midst of all this, Moses intercedes on the people’s behalf.

Read: Exodus 32

Exodus 32:11-13 Moses’ prayer for idolatrous Israel.
Deuteronomy 9:25-29, Moses prays for 40 days & nights.
Exodus 32:14 The LORD’s answer

Questions for thought:

- **Did Moses change God’s mind?** (Be careful with your answer and be sure you read the whole story. This whole generation ends up dying in the desert over the next forty years. Only Joshua and Caleb are spared the judgment that comes from this situation and others. The people that entered the Promised Land were the children and grandchildren of these people.)
- **Does Moses love Israel more than God?**
- **Is Moses wiser than God in this situation?**
- **Or was God testing Moses’ heart as a true shepherd of Israel?**
- **Or was the LORD using this situation to develop Moses’ ministry as an intercessor and shepherd?**
- **When we pray, can we change God’s mind? Is this a healthy way to look at prayer? Did Jesus teach us to pray as if we could change God’s mind?**
